"Risky Living"

Matthew 25:14-30

INTRODUCTION:


Risky living... is it worth taking a risk for the sake of Christ?

I. GOD TAKES A RISK FOR US

- A. What bigger risk could there be than God's "John 3:16 risk"?
- B. Parents take the risk of love for rebellious children
- C. At the cross of Jesus God risked it all to pay our debt of sin
- D. God continues to risk for us, as He puts His blessings into our hands (Matthew 25:14)

II. GOD ASKS US TO TAKE A RISK FOR HIM (Matthew 25:14-30)

- A. The parable of the talents (a "talent" is approximately 20 years salary) is not complicated: one servant got 5 talents, one got 2 and one got 1
 - 1. God gives us His treasure & asks us to take the risk of using it for Him
 - 2. We are not to just hoard it & keep it for ourselves
- B. God owns; we manage (a steward manages the property of another)
 - 1. We have a problem with the concept of ownership & possessions
 - The boy with the 'mountain' of french-fries
 - 2. When God asks us to manage (be a steward) He is doing us a big favour; He protects us from the foolishness of thinking we can handle life alone.



C. God entrusts; we take a risk by investing for Him

- 1. In the parable of the talents, one servant hoarded in fear... buried his talent, but two servants risked... invested... and experienced great joy (Matthew 25:19-23)
- 2. Like a child learning to walk, when we step out in faith, trust God and risk, we experience great joy

D. God expects a return

- 1. The master in the parable returned so the servants could give to Him (with interest) what he loaned to them
- 2. We give to God, not to the church budget; we give to God, not to pay bills

CONCLUSION: Our risky management brings God's reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:21 & 23)
