# "Two Sides of One Coin" 

(Exodus 32:1-14)

## INTRODUCTION: The definition of "paradox" $\boldsymbol{\&}$ the meaning of " sides of one coin"

I. TODAY'S EXODUS 32 TEXT IS QUITE THE 2 SIDED COIN
A. Here we see God "repenting", changing His mind
B. The key verses are verses $7,10 \& 14$
C. The context is God's anger over the people of Israel making the golden calf

## II. SOME 2 SIDED COINS ARE QUITE AMAZING

A. After deliverance from Egypt, the people forsake God \& make a golden idol
B. God' anger burns \& He is willing to forsake Israel, but bless Moses (v.10)
C. Moses will not receive the blessing; instead he intercedes for Israel (vv. 11-13)

1. He appeals to God's reasonableness (v.11)
2. He appeals to God's reputation (v.12)
3. He reminds God of His own promise (v.13)


## EXODUS 32:1-14

III. THE WONDER OF THIS 2 SIDED COIN IS SHOWN IN THE EXTENT OF GOD'S ANGER \& THE INTENSITY OF MOSES' INTERCESSION
A. Deuteronomy 9:25 tells us Moses lay on his face 40 days \& nights pleading
B. Today's Exodus text (v.14) says God then changed His mind!
C. The God Who does not change, did change!
D. Here's the divine paradox: He does not give us what we deserve... this reveals to us what it is about God that does NOT change: His love for sinners is stronger than His hatred of sin
E. Here's the divine paradox: His precious Word of Law $\boldsymbol{\&}$ Gospel
F. We see this paradox in:

1. Our faith shared
2. The Word proclaimed
3. The Sacraments of Baptism \& Communion
G. And - the clearest paradox: The cross of our Lord Jesus - wrath \& mercy at the same time (Isaiah 53:12)
